

## Yom Hashoah Virtual Commemoration Procedures

## **Commemoration slideshow**

Open the <u>slideshow</u> and click on PRESENT

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Slide	Content	Description/Instructions	Duration
1	Introduction to the ceremony	You can display this opening slide while everyone gets connected and prepares for the ceremony.	2'
2	Opening Music Presentation	The <i>Partisan Hymn</i> is sung in Yiddish by Montreal survivor Fishel Goldig. It's also the reading featured on slide #4 (in English).	2'
		<b>Student participation:</b> Ask one or two students to read the introductory notes about the hymn and the singer.	
3	Opening Music	Click to start the song. If you want, you can play the video fullscreen.	3'
		If you're sharing the slideshow on a video conference application, don't forget to share computer sound!	
4	Opening Remarks	You can prepare your own opening remarks, or use the speech provided in the slideshow.	3'
5	Reading	The Partisan Hymn highlights the suffering and death of the Jews during the Holocaust, but also their resistance to Nazi barbarity. It is a song of both pain and hope.	5'
		<b>Student participation:</b> Ask 5 different students to each read one stanza of the hymn.	
6	Testimony's presentation	Ursula Feist's testimony highlights her experience as a child during the Holocaust and her feelings after the Holocaust.	ין
		<b>Student participation:</b> Ask a student to read the survivor's brief biography before watching the testimony.	
7	Testimony	Click to start the video. If you want, you can play the video fullscreen.	4'
		If you're sharing the slideshow on a video conference application, don't forget to share computer sound!	

8	Candle Lighting	The ceremony concludes with 6 candles being lit to commemorate the 6 million Jewish victims of the Holocaust. You can light these candles yourself, or invite students to participate.	5'
		<b>Student participation</b> : Ask 6 students to each light a candle and share them via the video camera. Alternately, ask your students to each gather 6 candles in advance, which you can then all light simultaneously.	
		It could be traditional candles, LED ones or even candles that students draw before.	
9	End of the ceremony	This can be a moment of individual reflection for students, or a time to answer their questions. You could also introduce or assign the Extension Activity.	5'
