OUR HISTORY

The Montreal Holocaust Museum, formerly known as the Montreal Holocaust Memorial Centre, was founded in 1979 by Holocaust survivors and young leaders of the Montreal Jewish community.

Today, the Museum is Canada's only recognized Holocaust museum.

OUR MISSION

The Montreal Holocaust Museum informs people of all ages and backgrounds about the Holocaust while raising awareness about the universal perils of antisemitism, racism, hate, and indifference. Through its exhibitions, educational activities, and commemorative programs, the Museum promotes respect for diversity and the sanctity of human life.

REMARKS FROM **OUR PRESIDENT**AND **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

Dear Friends,

This past year has seen many challenges, important decisions, and emotions.

The pandemic forced many of us to reinvent ourselves and to seek creative solutions through new practices and platforms. It allowed us to appreciate the virtues of resilience, solidarity, and creativity. As a result of our diverse online public programming, we are proud to have reached a record number of 18,000 people. We welcomed 45,000 visitors to our virtual exhibitions, and our online videos were viewed over 263,000 times.

Our professional team expertly handled an increased workload of remote and in person activities, as well as the demanding responsibilities of the future Museum.

The team showed outstanding dedication that matched its immense talent. We are deeply grateful to them.

We also owe our institution's success to an engaged Board of Directors, whose recommendations and decisions allowed the Museum to attain its objectives, establish its priorities, and weather the turbulence of this past year. Specifically, we would like to highlight the exceptional contribution of Dorothy Zalcman Howard, our outgoing president, for her wisdom, poise, and strength of her commitment. No words can adequately express our gratitude.

We are also deeply honoured to work alongside 18 Holocaust survivors and witnesses to history who shared their testimonies online with 2,000 people this past year. Words fail to convey the full extent of our admiration and respect for them. They are outstanding ambassadors of an institution dedicated to denouncing hatred, antisemitism, and oppression. Our mission is our commitment to them.

Albert Schweitzer wrote that ideals for humans are equivalent to stars for sailors. Although we can never reach them, they remain our guides. Over the past year, 3,300 students visited the Museum. In retelling the history of the Shoah, our volunteer guides helped us build a more tolerant and respectful world. They are our stars.

Regarding the future Museum, this year we reached an important milestone by acquiring a lot at 3535 Boulevard Saint-Laurent. Located in the heart of Montreal and at the junction of the Museum sector and Quartier des Spectacles, this future signature building will become a new Montreal destination.

Additionally, it will become a space dedicated to the preservation of memory and the transmission of the legacy of survivors of the Holocaust.

This exciting project is becoming a reality thanks to the exceptional work of Julia Reitman, Alice Herscovitch, and Sébastien Coté. We cannot

thank them enough. We are grateful to the Azrieli Foundation, the founders and benefactors of the future Museum, and our treasured donors, whose support allows our Museum to flourish. Their presence and their generosity confirm the relevance of our mission and encourage us to live up to their highest ambitions.

We would also like to recognize and thank the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications, as well as Canadian Heritage, for their invaluable support since the outbreak of the pandemic. We are incredibly grateful for their encouragement.

Finally, we would like to express our gratitude to the visitors, students, and teachers who have accompanied us for 42 years. It is an honour to have them by our side as we continue educating people of all ages and backgrounds about the history of the Holocaust and the dangers of indifference, hatred, racism, and antisemitism.

EXHIBITIONS AND MUSEUM VISITORS

Like countless other museums, the COVID-19 pandemic forced us to close our doors not once, but twice in the past 18 months. Despite the unprecedented challenges that we faced, the Museum's dedicated staff and volunteers adapted quickly to the situation and found innovative ways to share the lessons of the Holocaust with new audiences. Thanks to new virtual exhibits, special online presentations, and the ongoing collection of artefacts, the Museum's exhibitions and collections continued to grow during the pandemic. The Museum's virtual exhibits were visited by a record number of online users. We also launched two new virtual exhibits: Ports of Exile, Home Harbours in partnership with the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, La Fabrique des Savoirs in Elbeuf (Réunion des Musées Métropolitains, Rouen Normandie), Musée d'Histoire de Marseille, and the French American Museum Exchange and Witnesses to History, Keepers of Memory.

The latter has received international recognition by FWA, CSS Design Awards, Awwwards, and Idéa for its web design and content.

ARTEFACT DONATIONS

The Museum's collection of **13,505 objects** related to Jewish life before, during, and after the Holocaust continues to grow annually.

We are grateful to our donors, primarily Holocaust survivors and their families, who entrust us with their precious personal objects for preservation. Once integrated into our collection, these important artefacts are used to educate Museum visitors of all ages about the history of the Holocaust and the personal stories of those who survived and those who were killed.

1 Muguette Myers received this small colourful vest from her grandmother when she was 10 years old at the beginning of the 1940s. This precious object accompanied Muguette through all stages of her life.

EDUCATION

Despite the challenges of the past year, demand for Holocaust and human rights education continued to grow. The closure of the Museum allowed us to expand and improve our virtual education programming for groups.

Thanks to the adaptability and dedication of both the Museum staff and our outstanding volunteers, our new virtual testimonies, workshops, and history lessons reached thousands of students and teachers.

Furthermore, Museum professionals continued to train educators in order to equip them with the tools to teach the complex history of the Holocaust.

EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

- 3,669 participants attended a virtual survivor testimony, a workshop, or a history lesson
- **60 schools** consisting of over **3,300 students** visited the Museum online and in-person
- Over 25 pedagogical tools adapted to the programmes of several Ministries of Education across Canada are available online for free
- **246 students and 13 classes** (from Gaspé, Rimouski, Saguenay, St-Tite, Gatineau, the Beauce, the Eastern Townships and Montreal) participated in our École en Réseau activity about The Heart from Auschwitz
- 1 new immersive sound application based on the story of Holocaust survivor Muguette Myers created with PRISM (the digital innovation lab of the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, funded by the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications) was tested by 105 students
- **2,570 students** learned about the Holocaust through our pedagogical kits (The Heart from Auschwitz and Hana's Suitcase) borrowed by their teachers
- 4,450 views of the online video series Objects
 of Memory featuring Museum guides





PUBLIC PROGRAMMING

At the onset of the pandemic, the Museum quickly adapted its programming and began offering virtual events as early as April 2020. Thanks to numerous digital platforms and 45 partnerships with local, national, and international organisations, the Museum's programming reached a record number of 18,000 people.

Over the course of the past year, participants attended **30** Museum book launches, survivor testimonies, film screenings, artefact presentations, and educational conferences all from their homes.

YOM HASHOAH

Over 1,300 people watched our virtual Yom Hashoah commemoration event on April 7, 2021. The ceremony has now been viewed over 3,500 times.


The commemoration included survivor testimonies from Gilbert Uzan, Muguette Myers, Leo Kliot, Pinchas Blitt, the late Lily Toth, and the late Ursula Feist, as well as reflections from their children and grandchildren. Viewers also watched a special musical performance from Alexandre Da Costa, Artistic Director and Conductor of the Symphonic Orchestra of Longueuil. The commemoration was organised in partnership with the Atlantic Jewish Council, the Azrieli Foundation, the Canadian Sephardi Federation, Communauté Sépharade Unifiée du Québec, the Cummings Centre, Federation CJA, the Jewish Heritage Centre of Western Canada, the Raoul Wallenberg Centre for Human Rights, the Sarah and Chaim Neuberger Holocaust Education Centre, and the Vancouver Holocaust Education Centre.

KRISTALLNACHT

To mark the anniversary of the Kristallnacht pogrom, the Museum organised a virtual event featuring commemorative songs and prayers followed by a presentation by Jonathan Kirsch, author of *The Short Strange Life of Herschel Grynszpan*. Over 500 viewers watched the event and learned how the Nazis used Gynszpan's assassination of a German diplomat as justification to launch Kristallnacht.

IN REMEMBRANCE

This year, we said a sorrowful farewell to our dear friend **Hanna Eliashiv z"I.** Over the last decade, she acted as co-chair of the Remembrance Committee and the Kristallnacht Commemoration Committee. Her remarkable leadership played a profound role in shaping how we commemorate the Shoah today.





ORAL HISTORY

During the pandemic, many turned to Holocaust survivors as role models of hope and resilience. The Montreal Holocaust Museum was no exception. Despite the challenges of learning new technology and adapting to volunteering from home, the majority of the Museum's 18 Holocaust survivor speakers were able to tell their stories to nearly 2,000 students and online visitors. They also shared their testimonies with numerous journalists, inspiring a plethora of listeners and readers with their remarkable stories of courage.

ORAL HISTORY COLLECTION

Once we are able to safely record survivor testimony, we will continue adding new recordings to our collection of **858 Holocaust survivor stories.**

Over 20,000 people have visited *Witnesses* to *History, Keepers of Memory* since its launch in September 2020.






Sadly, fifteen Holocaust survivors whose testimonies are part of the Museum's oral history collection passed away this year.


HUMAN RIGHTS

The history of the Holocaust teaches us about the dangers of indifference and informs our collective obligation to speak out against racism, antisemitism, and xenophobia. By drawing upon the lessons of the past, we encourage individuals to speak out against all forms of hatred in the present.

During this especially difficult year in which the world reckoned with systemic racism, the rise of racially motivated hate crimes, the proliferation of antisemitism, and ongoing genocide, the Museum did not remain silent. In the past year, we organized **5 online events** about contemporary human rights issues. These events were **viewed nearly 6,000 times**:

- A commemoration of the Romani Genocide in partnership with Romanipe. Following the annual event, and after years of hard work, the Canadian Government officially recognized the Romani Genocide.
- A panel discussion about anti-Black racism, hosted in partnership with the Segal Centre, featured Josa Maule, Rivka Campbell, Lisa Ndejuru, and Mike Payette.
- A panel discussion and film screening of Les oubliées des grands lacs about the current human rights crisis in Burundi in partnership with Alliance des Burundais du Canada, MIGS, Page Rwanda, and the Raoul Wallenberg Centre for Human Rights.
- A discussion about the ongoing persecution of Uyghurs and other Turkic Muslim minorities in partnership with Uyghur Rights Advocacy Project, Jewish Movement for Uyghur Freedom, Montreal Board of Rabbis, and other partners during Action Week Against Racism.

We officially became the owners of a 20,000 sq. ft. lot at 3535 Saint-Laurent Boulevard just north of Sherbrooke St. This remarkable site is close to universities and several other museums, it is easily accessible by public transit, and it gives us the presence and visibility we have long dreamed of.



AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Directors of Montreal Holocaust Museum

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Montreal Holocaust Museum (the Museum), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2021, and the statements of operations, changes in fund balances andcash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Museum as at March 31, 2021, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, Montreal Holocaust Museum derives revenue from donations the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our audit of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the accounts of the Montreal Holocaust Museum. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to contributions, excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses and cash flows for the years ended March 31, 2021 and 2020, current assets as at March 31, 2021 and 2020 and net assets as at April 1 and March 31 for both the 2021 and 2020 years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2020 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Museum in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Museum's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Museum or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Museum's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from

material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they couldreasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Museum's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty

exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Museum's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the

financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Museum to cease to continue as a going concern. Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content

Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

 We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing

of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
