OUR HISTORY

The Montreal Holocaust Museum, formerly known as the Montreal Holocaust Memorial Centre, was founded in 1979 by Holocaust survivors and young leaders of the Montreal Jewish community. Today, the Museum is Canada's only recognized Holocaust museum.

OUR MISSION

The Montreal Holocaust Museum informs people of all ages and backgrounds about the Holocaust while raising awareness about the universal perils of antisemitism, racism, hate, and indifference. Through its exhibitions, educational activities, and commemorative programs, the Museum promotes respect for diversity and the sanctity of human life.



MUSEUM **VISITORS**

8,590 visitors to our permanent exhibition. Students, tourists, and visitors of all ages and backgrounds came to our Museum to learn about the history of Jewish life before, during, and after the Holocaust. In discovering hundreds of historical objects and remarkable survivor testimonies, visitors left with a better understanding of the importance of respecting diversity, fighting all forms of hatred, and speaking out against racism and antisemitism.

The human rights legacy of the Holocaust was also transmitted to **46,062 online visitors** from around the world who explored our **5 virtual exhibitions**.

OUR COLLECTION

The Montreal Holocaust Museum's collection is unique in Canada and tells the stories of survivors who rebuilt their lives here after the Shoah. This year, our collection has grown to **13,616 objects and 871 recorded survivor testimonies**, thanks to the outstanding generosity of survivors and their families. Our ongoing work collecting and preserving the stories of survivors and their precious objects ensures that future generations of visitors, researchers, and students will be able to learn about history through the experiences of those who witnessed it.

A NEW SURVIVOR STORY

RAE GROPPER'S STORY

This year, Holocaust survivor and Museum Board member Rachel (Rae) Gropper added her recorded testimony to our collection and began sharing her story with school groups.

Rae was born in 1941 in the POW coalmines of Jegorshino in the former USSR's Ural Mountains. Her family endured horrific conditions in the camp, a lack of food, and freezing temperatures. In 1943, they were shipped on open flatcars to Samarkand in Uzbekistan where they were forced to work in flourmills. About 100 children travelled on the treacherous flatcars, and only 10 survived, including Rae.

The family returned to their native country of Poland in 1946 but were confronted with antisemitism. After living in a DP camp in Austria for three years, Rae's mother was recruited by the International Ladies Garment Workers' Union to work as a designer in a factory in Montreal. The family began rebuilding their lives in Canada in 1949.









ORAL HISTORY

Holocaust survivors are the heart of our Museum, and we have the privilege of working with a remarkable group of 12 volunteer speakers who embody the mission and importance of our organisation. Just this year, survivors shared their testimonies with over **4,700 people**. With great resilience and adaptability, these outstanding survivor speakers continued to share their testimonies online with students and visitors throughout the entirety of the pandemic.

- Over **3,400 students** heard survivor testimony online
- Over **1,370 members** of the public heard survivor testimony online

DIMENSIONS IN TESTIMONY



AN INTERACTIVE BIOGRAPHY

This year, the Museum recorded the first-ever French interactive survivor biography with USC Shoah Foundation's Dimensions in Testimony. Through innovative technology, visitors at our new Museum will engage in a virtual conversation with a hologram-like recording of survivor Marguerite Élias Quddus. People will be able to ask questions that prompt real-time responses from the pre-recorded video, revolutionizing the future of Holocaust memory and education. Only 24 such recordings



EDUCATION

As numerous studies across North America demonstrate a lack of Holocaust knowledge among young people, our Museum continues to work tirelessly to provide meaningful learning opportunities to students. Through **teacher trainings, free pedagogical tools, virtual school programs, and in-person activities**, we continue to play an active role in equipping educators to teach the history of the Holocaust and promote its relevance today.

■ EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

- 25 pedagogical tools adapted to the Ministère de l'Éducation's programmes are available online for free
- 9,318 downloads of our pedagogical tools around the world
- In-person and virtual programs were at full capacity for school groups in March, April, and May 2022
- Over 13,800 students participated in a Museum program:
 - 5,146 students visited the Museum in-person
 - Over 6,200 students participated in our virtual programs (history classes, survivor testimonies, and workshops)
 - 2,454 students and 58 teachers participated in our in-class activities about Hana's Suitcase and the Heart from Auschwitz


MEDIA AND OUTREACH




PUBLIC PROGRAMMING



COMMEMORATIONS

Our annual commemorations of Kristallnacht (the Night of Broken Glass) and Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) are important moments for individuals to remember the six million victims, pay tribute to the survivors, and honour the memory of the Holocaust.

■ KRISTALLNACHT



Over **1,630 people** have viewed our commemoration of Kristallnacht organised in partnership with the Segal Centre for Performing Arts and the Cummings Centre. The event included commemorative songs and prayers followed by dramatic readings from the book The Night of Broken Glass: Eyewitness Accounts of Kristallnacht performed by actors from the Dora Wasserman Yiddish Theatre and Joey Elias, son of the late co-chair of our Kristallnacht committee, Hanna Eliashiv z"l.

■ YOM HASHOAH



Our virtual 2022 Yom Hashoah ceremony has been viewed by over **2,300 people** from around the world. The event included an extraordinary conversation between **Maxwell Smart**, Holocaust survivor and artist, and **Elaine Kalman Naves**, author and journalist. The Dora Wasserman Yiddish Theatre performed songs written by Mordechai Gebirtig, renowned Yiddish poet and

songwriter killed in the Krakow ghetto. Yom Hashoah was organized in partnership with the Atlantic Jewish Council, the Calgary Jewish Federation, the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21, the Neuberger Holocaust Education Centre, the Segal Centre for Performing Arts, and the Vancouver Holocaust Education Centre.

On the morning of Yom Hashoah, we welcomed **Valérie Plante, Mayor of Montreal**, to the Museum for a special visit and commemoration ceremony. During the event, Mayor Plante announced the City of Montreal's \$1.5 M investment in our new Museum project. **Over 3,300 people** have since watched the ceremony streamed live on Facebook.









HUMAN RIGHTS

The history of the Holocaust teaches us about the dangers of indifference and informs our collective obligation to speak out against racism, antisemitism, and xenophobia. By drawing upon the lessons of the past through public programs, educational activities, and official statements, we encourage individuals to speak out against all forms of hatred in the present.

- A walking tour following the Refugee Boulevard audio guide in partnership with the Montreal History Festival

- Development of educational events about the Holocaust and antisemitism for **Richter, Davies, and Apple** in the context of their diversity and inclusion efforts for employees
- Unveiling of a mural dedicated to Aristides de Sousa Mendes, Righteous Among the Nations in partnership with the Portuguese Community, the Consul General of Portugal in Montreal and the Festival Portugal International de Montréal.


THE **NEW MUSEUM PROJECT**

In 2025, the Montreal Holocaust Museum will open its doors at **3535 Saint-Laurent Boulevard, in the heart of the city**. Located at the crossroads of the city's museum sector and the Quartier des spectacles entertainment hub, the new Museum will be a beacon in Quebec's cultural world. This major expansion will further our leadership role across Canada in Holocaust education and the prevention of antisemitism, racism, hatred, and discrimination. The Museum will be visible, welcoming, and adapted to visitor needs.

This year, we officially announced our new Museum project to the public and welcomed historic funding from the Government of Canada, the Government of Quebec, the City of Montreal, the Azrieli Foundation, and other generous private donors. We had the honour of welcoming Minister Benoit Charette and Mayor Valérie Plante to the Museum to announce their official support.










AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Directors of Montreal Holocaust Museum

QUALIFIED OPINION

We have audited the financial statements of Montreal Holocaust Museum (the Museum), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2022, and the statements of operations, changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Museum as at March 31, 2022, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended inaccordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. policies.

BASIS FOR QUALIFIED OPINION

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, Montreal Holocaust Museum derives revenue from donations the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our audit of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the accounts of the Montreal Holocaust Museum. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to contributions, excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses and cash flows for the years ended March 31, 2022 and 2021, current assets as at March 31, 2022 and 2021 and net assets as at April 1 and March 31 for both the 2022 and 2021 years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2021 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Museum in accordance with the ethical requirements that accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT AND THOSE CHARGED WITH GOVERNANCE FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Museum's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Museum or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Museum's financial reporting process.

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Museum's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Museum's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Museum to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
