OUR HISTORY

The Montreal Holocaust Museum, formerly known as the Montreal Holocaust Memorial Centre, was founded in 1979 by Holocaust survivors and young leaders of the Montreal Jewish community.

Through its exhibitions, educational activities, and commemorative programs, the Museum promotes respect for diversity and the sanctity of human life.

REMARKS FROM OUR PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

Over the past year, current events have hit home for the Montreal Holocaust Museum. We have witnessed a disturbing rise of antisemitic incidents, the abuse of refugee and minority rights, and worrying public surveys that confirm a lack of awareness about the Holocaust.

The culture of contempt continues to flourish, and intolerant regimes gain power and support. Former President of the International Committee of the Red Cross Peter Maurer stated that, "We cannot guarantee that a humanitarian catastrophe of the extent of the Holocaust will not happen again. On the contrary, we witness a catalogue of atrocities, every day, in wars across the globe." To understand his concern, one must simply acknowledge the recent experiences of the Uyghurs, Yazidis, Rohingya, or Armenians in Artsakh.

While these alarming findings are cause for concern, they are also crucial reminders of society's need for the Montreal Holocaust Museum. They remind us of the importance of our mission and our work educating the public about the dangers of racism, antisemitism, and hate.

This year, a remarkable 25,000 visitors took part in our in - person educational programs at the Museum, from tours of the permanent exhibition to survivor testimonies and workshops.

In terms of school audiences, we welcomed nearly 16,000 students:

- 10,829 students and teachers visited the Museum in groups and atended tours, survivor testimonies, and workshops.
- 2,489 students and teachers took part in our virtual programs.
- 2,312 students and 69 teachers borrowed our teaching tools about Hana's Suitcase and the Heart from Auschwitz.
- 1,085 teachers were trained by the Museum in conferences and workshops.

We are proud to highlight the role of Education Coordinator Anne Marguet, who expertly led training sessions at Yad Vashem in Israel for teachers from France and Canada. These outstanding education results would not have been possible without the invaluable support of the Asper Foundation and the Azrieli Foundation. We are sincerely grateful to them.

As Arthur Koestler wrote, "Statistics don't bleed; it is the detail which counts." This is why our permanent exhibition tells the history of the Holocaust through the personal stories, objects, and testimonies of survivors who rebuilt their lives in Montreal.

Our collection now contains 12,892 objects, the largest collection of Holocaust-related artefacts in Canada. Each object sheds light on the diverse experiences of Jews during the Shoah, from ghettos and camps to life in hiding and escape. This remarkable collection of objects also confirms our role as Canada's trustee of History and Memory. We will continue to assume our responsibility towards victims of hate and persecution, and to promote respect for the sanctity of human life.

Our public programming confirms our roots in the community and in Montreal. We are proud to have reached over 9,000 people through a rich and varied series of events developed with our 41 partners.

The Museum also experienced unprecedented visibility and outreach this year. Over 382,200 people visited our website (an increase of 34% from last year). The Museum was the subject of 202 articles and mentions in print and digital media, setting a new record for the organisation.

Our social media #MuseumInstaswap project, made possible thanks to the generosity of the Ministère de la Culture et des Communications, reached 297,000 people. This project brought our Museum together with the Canadian Museum for Human Rights and the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21.

Overall, these outstanding results testify to the demand for our programs and the necessity of building a downtown Museum to better serve our new audiences.

Our new Museum project is taking shape thanks to the herculean efforts of Dorothy Zalcman Howard, Chair of the New Museum Steering Committee, Julia Reitman, Chair of the Give Voice Fundraising Campaign, and Richard Schnurbach, Chair of the New Museum Finance Committee. It is advancing daily thanks to their talent, dedication, and conviction. Their names are already engraved in the great book of gratitude.

We would also like to express our infinite appreciation to all the professionals and consultants who put so much energy into making this dream a reality. Thank you Alice, Helen, Anthony, Audrey, Sarah, Marie-Blanche, Sébastien, Robert Jan and all those who ensure the operation, growth, and impact of our organisation. While difficult to name everyone, we are tremendously grateful to you all.

Of course, we cannot conclude without thanking the donors, guides, witnesses to history, and professionals who give meaning to our work.

Allow us to express our infinite gratitude for your involvement and generosity in building this extraordinary legacy for future generations.

This year, nearly 25,000 visitors participated in educational programming in-person at our Museum from tours of the permanent exhibit to survivor testimonies and workshops.







Beyond the walls of our Museum, online visitors also had the opportunity to learn more about the history of the Holocaust and its human rights legacy through our virtual exhibitions. This year, 40,500 online visitors from around the world explored our 5 virtual exhibitions.

OUR COLLECTION

The Montreal Holocaust Museum's collection is unique in Canada and tells the stories of survivors who rebuilt their lives here after the Shoah.

This year, our collection has grown to 12,892 objects and 890 recorded survivor testimonies.

Our ongoing work collecting and preserving the stories of survivors and their precious objects ensures that future generations will be able to learn about history through the stories of those who witnessed it.



COLLECTION HIGHLIGHTS

- 141 new objects and 12, 892 objects total
- **25** new survivor testimonies recorded and **890** recordings total
- 18 objects loaned to 5 institutions including Musée Pointe-à Callière, the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21, the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, and the Thunder Bay Museum.



THEODORUS' VIOLIN CASE AND BOW

Theodorus Eliza Schuur was born in the Netherlands on July 29, 1917. He was a gifted musician and a doctor. During the war, he saved several Jews using his ambulance as a means of escape. Notably, he helped his violin teacher's family escape from the Nazis, but unfortunately, not the teacher himself. On a visit to the Netherlands long after the war, the family gave Theodorus this beautiful tortoiseshell bow to thank him for his efforts.



Theodorus married and settled in the U.S. where he welcomed two daughters. In 2017, long after Theodorus' death, his daughter gave her father's beloved violin, bow, and case to Shani Anne Massa, the daughter of a friend in Québec.

This year, Shani-Anne graciously donated the case and bow to our Museum. Remarkably, she will continue playing the violin with the Montreal Youth Symphony Orchestra this season.

ORAL HISTORY

In addition to transmitting survivor stories through recorded testimonies, we also work alongside a remarkable group of survivor speakers who share their experiences inperson and online with people of all ages and backgrounds.





This year, an inspiring group of 10 volunteer survivor speakers shared their testimony with over 4,560 individuals.

Since our founding in 1979, Holocaust survivors have remained at the heart of our Museum, and their legacies impact all aspects of our work.



- Over **4,250 students** heard survivor testimony in-person and online
- Over **400 members of the public** heard survivor testimony
- Partnership with Liberation 75 and the USC Shoah Foundation's Last Chance Testimony Collection Initiative which brought the Museum beyond Montreal to Ottawa, the Laurentians, Rigaud, and Moncton to record new testimonies
- Partnership with Sephardi Voices to integrate the testimonies of Sephardi survivors into the Museum's collection
- 1,042 public interactions with Dimensions in Testimony, an interactive French recording of Holocaust survivor Marguerite Élias Quddus






A NEW SURVIVOR STORY


Malka Treitel was born in 1937 in Budapest, Hungary. Shortly after the German occupation of Hungary, Malka and her family were arrested, released, and living separately in hiding. She lived under a false identity on a farm until she was denounced and sent to a Budapest prison. A solider took pity on Malka and allowed her to flee.

Thanks to her father's contacts, she was able to live in a safe house under the protection of the Swedish Embassy, where she was reunited with the rest of her family. A few days later, they were forced into the Budapest ghetto where they remained until liberation. The family left Hungary in 1948 and arrived in Montreal three years later.

EDUCATION

As we confront a lack of Holocaust awareness among young generations and an alarming rise of hate, our Museum works tirelessly to promote education and respect for diversity in Canadian classrooms.

Through teacher trainings, free pedagogical tools, virtual school programs, and in-person activities, we continue to play an active role in equipping educators to teach the history of the Holocaust and promote its relevance today.





EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

- **25 pedagogical tools** adapted to the Ministère de l'Éducation's programmes are available online for free
- **7,960 downloads** of our pedagogical tools around the world
- **11,830 students**, in a group and individually, visited our permanent exhibition
- **Nearly 16,000 students** participated in a Museum program:
 - **10,829 students and teachers** visited the Museum in-person in groups, where they attended tours, survivor testimonies, and workshops
 - 2,489 students and teachers participated in our virtual programs (history classes, survivor testimonies, and workshops)
 - 2,312 students and 69 teachers borrowed our in-class tool kits about Hana's Suitcase and the Heart from Auschwitz

Educator Denise LeBlanc won the Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Teaching for her project about the Museum's Heart from Auschwitz and the story of the survivor Muguette Myers





EDUCATION SEMINARS AT THE MUSEUM

This year, two important teacher seminars took place at the Museum: On November 30 in partnership with **Yad Vashem and the Azrieli Foundation**, we welcomed **33 educators** for a full day session about teaching the Holocaust. On June 27 (in-person) and July 4 (online), **65 teachers from Montreal and across Canada** attended a two-day seminar with renowned speakers like Dr. Doris Bergen, Pierre Anctil, Tal Bruttmann, and the Museum's own Education professionals.

INSTASWAP

This year, the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21, and the Montreal Holocaust Museum embarked on a special #MuseumInstaSwap project made possible by Quebec's Ministère de la Culture et des Communications.

COMMEMORATIONS

Our annual commemorations of Kristallnacht (the Night of Broken Glass) and Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) are important moments for individuals to remember the six million victims, pay tribute to the survivors, and honour the memory of the Holocaust.





KRISTALLNACHT

Over 215 people attended our first in-person commemoration of Kristallnacht since the outbreak of the pandemic. The event focused on the stories of two women whose lives were forever changed in the aftermath of Kristallnacht: Zlatka Pitluk and Fania Fainer, the women behind the remarkable object known as the Heart from Auschwitz.

Through the stories of their descendants, Sandy Fainer, Karina Feler, and Paul Pitluk, guests learned more about their resilience building new lives and the lessons transmitted to their loved ones.

YOM HASHOAH VEHAGVURAH

This year's Yom Hashoah Vehagvurah ceremony was attended in-person by **over 650 people and viewed online nearly 400 times**. The commemoration focused on the remarkable and diverse stories of resistance during the Shoah through survivor testimonies and photos. Through personal stories, commemorative songs, and traditional readings, attendees learned more about how Jewish people found extraordinary ways to maintain hope, preserve their humanity, continue religious practices, and attempt to prevent their killing.







COMMEMORATION AT CITY HALL

On April 18, 2023, Museum representatives including Hon. Jacques Saada, President, Allison Jaskolka, Legal Counsel, Judy Gardos-Bergman, Secretary, and Board members Rae Gropper, Brian Bronfman, and Brandon Knecht attended a commemoration ceremony alongside Valérie Plante, Mayor of Montreal, Aref Salem, Leader of the Official Opposition, Dominique Ollivier, Executive committee chair, Magda Popeanu, member of the Executive Committee and Mindy Pollak, City Councillor.

HUMAN RIGHTS

The history of the Holocaust teaches us about the dangers of indifference and informs our collective obligation to speak out against racism, antisemitism, and xenophobia. By drawing upon the lessons of the past through public programs, educational activities, and official statements, we encourage individuals to speak out against all forms of hatred in the present.





Following its inactivity during the pandemic, the Museum revived AGAR, the **Alliance for Genocide Awareness and Remembrance** whose member organisations represent diverse local communities affected by genocide. AGAR will begin working on collaborative public programming this fall.
