The Montreal Holocaust Museum, formerly known as the Montreal Holocaust Memorial Centre, was founded in 1979 by Holocaust survivors and young leaders of the Montreal Jewish community.

REMARKS FROM **PRESIDENT** AND **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

Dear friends of the Museum,

Once again, our annual report lays out our unique challenges and achievements.

The past few years with the pandemic presented many challenges to the Museum. This year, our Museum has had to cope with two other but equally significant crises: the outbreak of the conflict between Israel and Hamas post-October 7th and the teachers' strike on November 23, which closed 800 schools for 22 days. These crises shook our audiences, affected our teams, and disrupted our activities. The professional team managed, despite everything, to stay the course and lead our institution toward new successes, even as the new Museum project was prioritized.

We are incredibly proud to have welcomed 22,400 visitors over the past year and trained more than 926 teachers in 20 workshops, seminars, and conferences. We reached more than 25,000 students at the Museum, off-site, and online and our teaching tools were downloaded more than 6,800 times. Our rich public programming reached 7,200 participants at 35 public events. Our collection grew by 431 objects and 23 new interviews. We are pleased that 32 new donors joined the President's Circle. The Give Voice campaign, chaired by Julia Reitman has now raised an incredible \$113.5 million of its \$120 million goal.

As such, we must pay tribute to our professional team, which is an exceptionally competent and resilient group. They have enhanced our range of services, proposed new activities, enriched our collections, and invested in nurturing the new Museum project. We would also like to thank our Board of Directors, guides, Witnesses to History, and generous donors, including the Azrieli Foundation and the Asper Foundation, who are at the heart of our achievements and successes.

We would also like to acknowledge the vital role played by Julia Reitman and Dorothy Zalcman Howard in bringing the new Museum project to life. Julia's ambition, conviction, determination, and incredible commitment as Chair of the capital campaign made this huge dream a concrete reality. Dorothy's vision, organizational skills, and emotional genius were instrumental in rallying all wills and harnessing all energies to bring this dream to fruition. We cannot thank them enough. We also owe a debt of gratitude to Alice Herscovitch, the driving force behind this spectacular new Museum project. We are grateful for her talent and dedication. The new Museum bears her signature. Thank you, Alice. Acknowledgement must also be extended to Helen Malkin for her generosity, expertise and commitment which has been invaluable. She has been exceptionally diligent and determined to bring our new Museum project to life. Thanks to her involvement, it promises to be impressive.


It's a complicated time to celebrate, however, with the worrying rise in incidents of hatred, antisemitism, and Islamophobia.

At a time when racist rhetoric is being unleashed, when a self-proclaimed Montreal imam is publicly calling for the slitting of Jewish throats, when the notion of genocide is being trivialized and invoked to delegitimize Israel's right to exist, we have to admit, in all humility, that educating about the Shoah is not a vaccine against racism and cannot totally immunize against hatred and discrimination.

At the Montreal Holocaust Museum, we will never give in to hatred and division. We will continue to act out of respect for history and remembrance, and out of a sense of civic responsibility. We will continue to remind all our audiences that history has an unfortunate tendency to stutter, that words can kill, and that the Holocaust has universal significance. The Martinique writer Frantz Fanon once wrote: "When you hear people speak ill of the Jews, prick up your ears; they're talking about you."

Through our Museum, we aim to protect the freedom and dignity of all our fellow citizens.

"Tell Me A Story! Youth Literature and the Holocaust" and "Witnesses to History, Keepers of Memory" were presented to 780 people at the Grimsby Museum (Ontario) between January and May 2024.

OUR COLLECTION

The Montreal Holocaust Museum's collection is unique in Canada and tells the stories of survivors who rebuilt their lives here after the Shoah.

HIGHLIGHTS

- A rich collection of 13,323 objects.
- 431 new "treasures" were added to our collection this year.
- 23 new survivor testimonies were recorded, for a total of 917 recordings in our collection.
- 19 objects were loaned to 5 institutions, including the Grimsby Museum (Ontario), Musée Pointe-à Callière (Quebec), the Museum of Immigration at Pier 21 (Nova Scotia), the Canadian Museum for Human Rights (Manitoba), and the Fort Lennox National Historic Site (Quebec).

They first attempted to disembark on May 27 at the port of Havana, but only 28 passengers were allowed to enter in Cuba. Of the 907 passengers who returned to Europe, 255 were murdered in killing centers during the war.

Born in Bratislava on November 27, 1929, Marianne Bolgar (née Guttmann) moved to Budapest with her family in 1933. The German occupation of Hungary began on March 19,1944, and during the long days spent in hiding, Marianne knitted clothes for her doll.

"Csibi was a rag doll with soft, flexible arms and legs; she was easy to dress and undress. I designed and made playsuits, dresses, skirts, sweaters - clothes a young child would wear. VISITORS TO THE COLLECTION

This year, our collections team welcomed approximately 40 visitors to the archives: volunteer guides, researchers, donors, museum colleagues, and the families of Holocaust survivors.

For just over a year, Barbara Maass has volunteered in the Museum's storeroom, highlighting the artifacts of her father, Gerhart and her uncle Herbert. There are several hundred items: letters, photographs, publications, and objects, all of which trace her family's history during the Holocaust. While researching her family history, Barbara Maass did vital work identifying, cataloging, and interpreting the items, which profondly contributed to the collection's documentation.

ORAL HISTORY

Our oral history collection has grown to include 917 testimonies. This past year, the Museum conducted 23 new interviews with Holocaust survivors. Most survivors interviewed live in the Montreal area, but our work has brought us as far as Ottawa and Toronto to speak to survivors who first landed in Montreal.

For the first time since our oral history project began, we conducted as many interviews in French as in English, which allows us to share even more stories with francophone audiences.

- We interviewed survivors from Poland, Romania, Hungary, France, and Belgium, and for the first time since we started interviewing 30 years ago, from Morocco.
- This year, we completed our partnership with Liberation 75, whose aim was to collect **150 survivor interviews** from Canada as part of their Last Chance Initiative, to which the museum contributed **53 interviews** over the past two years.
- We continued interviewing survivors as part of our partnership with the USC Shoah Foundation, who provided funding for **13 new interviews** in 2023/24.
- Through a partnership with Sephardi Voices, we integrated seven testimonies of Jewish survivors from Tunisia and Iraq.

SURVIVOR TESTIMONY

We are honoured to have **10 survivors** who offer school groups the chance to relive history through their first-person testimonies. These are always incredibly moving and transformative experiences for the students, who are so privileged to hear these last Witnesses to History share their stories.

2,583 students had the privilege of listening to survivor testimonies at the Museum, while **740 others** met a survivor virtually.

• Our survivor speakers also visited a large number of schools and other institutions, both in Montreal and in other areas of Quebec. **2,138 students and adults** attended a survivor testimony, as did staff at the Defence Institute in Ottawa.

DIMENSIONS

The testing phase of Dimensions in Testimony, an interactive biography of Holocaust survivor **Marguerite Élias Quddus**, has continued. With another **1,852 public interactions in 2023/24**, we have reached the threshold of 8,000 public interactions needed to complete the testing phase.

The interactive biography, offered as an animated activity to visiting school groups, has been a great success for teachers and students alike.

EDUCATION

Planning for the 2023-2024 year had been influenced by two significant events.

First, the Ontario Ministry of Education's decision to require Holocaust education starting in Grade 6 encouraged us to market our expertise to Ontario teachers.

Secondly, the attack on Israel on October 7 had a profound emotional impact on the community, our professional team, and our audiences as a whole. Due to the significant increase in antisemitic incidents in Montreal and globally, we focused our 2024 seminar for Canadian educators on antisemitism and racism in the age of social media. Through partnerships with organizations in France, Germany, Quebec, Ontario, and Alberta, we developed a comprehensive program aimed at those who have incredible influence on today's youth to become the open-minded and tolerant citizens of tomorrow.

HIGHLIGHTS

• Our online pedagogical tools are available free of charge and include: **25 educational tools** adapted to the Ministry of Education's programs, recordings of two presentations made during the 2022 Seminar, an article titled "The Holocaust in Tunisia," and an article on "Antisemitic Caricatures at the Turn of the 20th Century." A teaching workshop on the use of primary sources titled "Finding refuge in Canada" will be available online soon.



DIGITAL MARKETING STATISTICS



On October 28, 2023, alone our online resource "10 Stages of Genocide" had over 16,457 visits.

Over the past year, our communications department navigated uncharted territory. After the events of October 7th, it was imperative for us to speak in a united and consistent voice and to be a source of education for our wider community. As such, the communications team was committed to responding to events as they transpired and providing communications resources to our internal team, the local and national press, and the public at large. Because of this consistent messaging, our digital footprint - including our social media and website - saw a period of remarkable growth. In the face of global events, the public often turned to us.

COMMEMORATIONS

Our annual commemorations of Kristallnacht (the Night of Broken Glass), International Day of Commemoration in Memory of the Victims of the Holocaust, and Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) are important moments for individuals to remember the six million victims, pay tribute to the survivors, and honour the memory of the Holocaust.



KRISTALLNACHT

Over 200 people attended the 85th anniversary of Kristallnacht that focused on the story of the Cytryn family, whose lives were forever changed by the world's failure to intervene following Kristallnacht and the Nazis' genocidal persecution of Jews.

Their story was told through Salomea Cytryn's own words, as her letters sent from the Warsaw ghetto to her husband Nathan in a prisoner of war camp were donated to the Montreal Holocaust Museum and translated by the Polish Institute of Science and Arts in Canada.

YOM HASHOAH VEHAGVURAH

700 people attended this year's Yom Hashoah VeHagvurah commemoration. This year's theme, "One People, One Fate," focused on the wide-ranging experiences of the Jewish communities affected by the Holocaust. Through a compelling video featuring testimonies of survivors from Greece, Italy, Poland, and Hungary, attendees learnt about the collective history that unites the Jewish people and the strength that has emerged from the darkest times the community has faced. The inclusion of Mizrahi community members in the ceremony further celebrates the rich diversity and shared fate.



INTERNATIONAL DAY OF COMMEMORATION IN MEMORY OF THE VICTIMS OF THE HOLOCAUST

To mark International Holocaust Remembrance Day, we partnered with Salle Bourgie to present a night of music called "Music at Theresienstadt," performed by Austrian baritone Wolfgang Holzmair and pianist Olivier Godin. More than 150 people enjoyed this incredibly moving recital, which featured music composed by prisoners in the Theresienstadt concentration camp.



CONSTRUCTION

Broccolini was hired as our Construction Manager and Colliers as Project Manager.

On the construction front, excavation is complete, as well as pipe and piling.

The foundation will be poured shortly, and the building envelope is expected to be closed by next winter.

Toronto-based Bruce Mau Design was hired to work on wayfinding and donor recognition.

Our co-curators Robert Jan van Pelt and Marie-Blanche Fourcade, along with designers Pelletier de Fontenay, La Bande à Paul, and Musealia, are hard at work designing our new permanent exhibit and chidren's exhibit, both of which will showcase the most extensive collection of Holocaust-related artifacts in Canada.
